

BEHOLD THE MYSTERY: A DIOCESAN EVENING OF ADORATION


Guide for joining in prayer from home

Through the national Eucharistic Revival, we are called into the mystery of communion with our Lord and invited to renew our belief in the Real Presence. On December 13, from 7-8 p.m., exposition of the Holy Eucharist will be celebrated in almost all parishes of the diocese to adore our Lord, offer our lives with Christ, and celebrate our unity as a local church. Even if we cannot be physically present, the Eucharist unites all of us in Christ. If you are unable to come to church, please set aside the hour of 7-8 p.m. for prayer in union with Catholics throughout the diocese. The following prayers will be used by Bishop Walkowiak at the Cathedral of St. Andrew and are offered as a guide to your own prayer from home.

AT THE BEGINNING OF THE HOUR

Sing or quietly reflect upon the words of these songs, giving thanks for God's presence among us, especially in the Most Holy Eucharist.

READING THE WORD OF GOD

The Church proclaims the following scriptural passages in honor of the Most Holy Eucharist. Read each passage slowly and attentively. If any words or phrases stand out to you, pause and meditate upon them. Then, offer prayer in response to the word of God upon which you have been meditating. Finally, rest in God's presence, allowing Him to act in your quiet contemplation.

First Reading

Deuteronomy 8:2-3, 14b-16a

A reading from the Book of Deuteronomy

Moses said to the people:

"Remember how for forty years now the LORD, your God, has directed all your journeying in the desert, so as to test you by affliction and find out whether or not it was your intention to keep his commandments. He therefore let you be afflicted with hunger, and then fed you with manna, a food unknown to you and your fathers, in order to show you that not by bread alone does one live, but by every word that comes forth from the mouth of the LORD.

"Do not forget the LORD, your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, that place of slavery; who guided you through the vast and terrible desert with its saraph serpents and scorpions, its parched and waterless ground; who brought forth water for you from the flinty rock and fed you in the desert with manna, a food unknown to your fathers."

Responsorial Psalm

Gospel John 6:24-35

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

When the crowd saw that neither Jesus nor his disciples were there, they themselves got into boats and came to Capernaum looking for Jesus.

And when they found him across the sea they said to him, "Rabbi, when did you get here?"

Jesus answered them and said, "Amen, amen, I say to you, you are looking for me not because you saw signs but because you ate the loaves and were filled.

Do not work for food that perishes but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. For on him the Father, God, has set his seal." So they said to him, "What can we do to accomplish the works of God?" Jesus answered and said to them, "This is the work of God, that you believe in the one he sent." So they said to him, "What sign can you do, that we may see and believe in you? What can you do? Our ancestors ate manna in the desert, as it is written: He gave them bread from heaven to eat." So Jesus said to them, "Amen, amen, I say to you, it was not Moses who gave the bread from heaven; my Father gives you the true bread from heaven. For the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world." So they said to him, "Sir, give us this bread always." Jesus said to them. "I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me will never hunger, and whoever believes in me will never thirst."

Continue praying with the word of God, in your own words, with devotions of your choice, or in silence until near the end of the hour, when the Cathedral liturgy resumes with intercessions.

AT THE END OF THE HOUR

The eyes of all look hopefully to the Lord, our God. Confident that he will answer all our needs, we now present to him our prayers.

For the Catholic Church in the United States, that during this time of revival we may renew our participation in the Eucharist and our belief in Christ's Real Presence, let us pray to the Lord.

R. Lord, hear our prayer.

For the people of God throughout our diocese, that we may be more clearly knit together as one Body of Christ, and celebrate our unity as his Bride, let us pray to the Lord.

R. Lord, hear our prayer.

For all who offer themselves with Christ, both within Mass and in adoration, that we may seize the adventure that arises from this encounter and place ourselves more fully at his service, let us pray to the Lord.

R. Lord, hear our prayer.

For our priests, who dispense the gifts of God from the tables of Word and Sacrament, that through their ministry all may find in Christ the food that endures for eternal life, let us pray to the Lord. R. Lord, hear our prayer.

For all who do not yet recognize Christ sacramentally present in the Eucharist, that the Spirit may grant them faith and reveal to them the sweetness of this true bread from heaven, let us pray to the Lord. *R. Lord, hear our prayer.*

For those who suffer trial and temptation, that in Christ's Body and Blood they may find comfort, joy, and strength to accomplish the works of God, let us pray to the Lord.

R. Lord, hear our prayer.

With Christ, we call upon the Father in the words our Savior gave us:
Our Father, who art in heaven,
hallowed be thy name;
thy kingdom come,
thy will be done
on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread,
and forgive us our trespasses,
as we forgive those who trespass against us;
and lead us not into temptation,
but deliver us from evil.

Sing or quietly reflect upon the words of this song of praise, then recite the prayers that follow.
